Regulatory Changes & Updates

Nurse Practitioner Regulation Framework Implementation Plan Project (NPR-FIPP) Update

As shared at the June Employer Reference Group (ERG) meeting, CNO is working together with the <u>Canadian Council for Registered Nurse Regulators</u> (CCRNR) to set up a proposed national framework for Nurse Practitioners (NPs) to make entry-level education, national entry-level exam and registration requirements consistent across Canada. Recent project activities and updates include

- adding updated national entry-level competencies to programs, starting September 2024
- talking with academics about continuing competence and specialization certificates
- developing a new national exam with an expected launch in 2026
- engaging with NPs and system partners at CNO's first town hall meeting on Sept. 5, 2024. A recording of the town hall will be posted soon.

At CNO's September Council meeting, Council approved proposed amendments to NP regulations under the *Nursing Act, 1991*, to be circulated to registrants and other system partners for 60 days. If the Ministry of Health approves the proposed regulations, the changes would remove the current NP specialty certificates and streamline the registration of NPs into one single classification. This would mean, in future, NPs would have a registration framework similar to Registered Nurses (RNs) and Registered Practical Nurses (RPNs), as CNO would no longer require NPs to register based on a specialty. The proposed changes do not affect NPs' accountability to practice within their scope of practice and competencies.

Personal Support Workers Regulation Change

In 2021, the <u>Health and Supportive Care Providers Oversight Authority Act, 2021</u>, was introduced, which set up the Health and Supportive Care Providers Oversight Authority (HSCPOA), an

independent regulatory body accountable to the ministry. The authority will register and oversee Personal Support Workers (PSWs) and will support public protection.

The HSCPOA has no physical location and will operate and register applicants online. Applicants can begin applying for registration in Fall 2024, with registration of eligible PSWs starting on <u>Dec. 1</u>, <u>2024</u>.

There are key differences between registration with the HSCPOA and other regulatory bodies formed under the *Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991*, including

- voluntary registration with no initial registration fees
- registration noted with a <u>visual mark by HSCPOA</u>
- no protected titles
- no defined scope of practice
- no PSWs on the HSCPOA board, only a PSW Advisory Committee

CNO does not expect any changes to nurses' accountability when working with registered or unregistered PSWs, as the PSWs would remain accountable to their employer. Employers determine the scope of practice of PSWs working in their organization, including the conditions of employment (for example, if registration with HSCPOA is required).

Regulation of Physician Assistants

Physician Assistants (PAs) have been working in Ontario as unregulated health care professionals since 2007. In 2019, the ministry began to explore formalizing the regulation of PAs and in June 2021, Bill 283 passed, *Advancing Oversight and Planning in Ontario's Health System Act, 2021*. Schedule 3 of this Bill amended the *Medicine Act, 1991*, to regulate PAs with the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario (CPSO). For PAs to be overseen by CPSO, amendments were made to the regulations. These amendments included requirements for registration, allowing delegation from physicians (under supervision) and setting up a quality assurance (QA) program. Physician Assistants can start registering in early 2025. Individuals who wish to practice as a PA must be registered by <u>April 1, 2025</u>. From that date, only PAs registered with CPSO are permitted to use the title "Physician Assistant" in Ontario. It is important to note, there is no change to the way PAs practice currently. At present, a PA's scope of practice reflects their supervising physician's scope of practice through delegation, and it is also determined by the PA's knowledge, skill and judgment. This means each PA's scope of practice will vary according to several factors, including the individual's education, training and experience. This will not change under the new regulations.

CNO does not expect changes to nurses' practice with PAs, as the delegation framework physicians use with PAs remains unchanged. The CPSO now can hold PAs accountable for quality assurance

requirements and professional misconduct, and nurses, as well as employers should be aware of this change moving forward.

Workforce Census Update

In February 2024, CNO launched its Workforce Census survey, and the first set of results are now available. The initial report describes the demographic, nursing practice and employment data from over 31,000 respondents. While CNO collects some demographic information from nurses upon initial registration and detailed employment information when they renew their registration each year, the census expands the scope of information collected to give a greater understanding of nurses in Ontario. On Sept. 23, nurses were chosen for Quality Assurance (QA) Assessment through a random and risk-based selection. If selected for QA Assessment, nurses are contacted by email, using the email on file in <u>Maintain Your Membership</u>.
